Exactly. I have a lot of booktalk that I want to do with you. So first, we want to tell you guys a couple of things. First of all, our deep dive today is going to be about what I am calling and if you get mad about it, blame me because it's my phrase, "one night stand" books. Now. it's not what you think. It's palate cleanser, slump busters, but a really specific kind that I think doesn't get a lot of attention. We do want to say right here at the top of the show that we're calling them "one night stand" books. And while the

conversation itself will be no spicier than any other conversation that we have Currently Reading, the fact that we're calling it "one night stand" and the little bit of innuendo that will probably follow that, we want to let you guys know about it right up front. We know a lot of you guys listen with your littles. So we just want to let you know that right up front. The other thing we want to tell you, you guys are not going to be surprised by this, it is the first episode of the month, which means it's the one commercial that you're going to hear from us all month long. So every you know, like one every four trips, I get to go in and not only get all my holds that they've so lovingly put together for all of us, but also, I get to get a new Book Pages and take that home and pour over it and circle the titles I'm interested in and they have stuff for kids too. And just I really, really like it. So if your library has that, take a look at the kind of front area where they have those kinds of things. They might have it and maybe you've never even noticed it. It's really useful. I absolutely love Book Pages. Alright, so those are our bookish moments of the week. Let's talk about current reads. Kaytee, what's your first current read you want to bring to us?

Okay, the first current read I have this week is The Inheritance of Orquidea Divina by Zoraida Cordova. This was one that we read with the Read the Damn Book Club, which is the four of us, right? Morgan made the selection but then Stephanie, Mindy and I jumped right on board, and we swallowed down the audio in just a few days. At the beginning of this book, Orguidea sends out invitations to her family. They are to return to the family home in Four Rivers, Texas for her funeral and the reading of her will. It's time to settle her estate even though she's still alive. Her descendants arrive from their scattered lives to find her not just at death's door, but sitting in a chair with roots growing from her body into the floor. Here begins the unraveling of Orguidea's story, her past mixed with a present time that threatens to unravel the family as well. This book is rife with magical realism and Ecuadorian culture. It's also chock full of characters that you will not soon forget. Much like the family Madrigal of Encanto, each family member here has a gift of sorts that they have to recognize and use and their matriarch is holding them all together. But unlike the Madrigals though, you are not going to consume this with your children, as there are a number of descriptive sex scenes. Part family drama, part road trip, part Ecuadorian legend and all gorgeously written, this book not only has a cover that gave me heart eyes, the story did as well. As a bonus, the author's website is the best one I've seen in forever. You can find a playlist that matches the book, an invitation to Orquidea's funeral that you can print out for yourself, a cocktail inspired by the book, and all the gorgeous covers that they released around the world. I loved it so much. I loved like scrolling through the website while I was listening to the audiobook. It is a multimedia experience. This one just totally stole my heart. I really enjoyed it. Although Mindy on the Mindy scale was like "I don't love these sex scenes. They're a little descriptive for me." So this was The Inheritance of Orquidea Divina by Zoraida Cordova.

There's just all kinds of interesting things that you'll never pick up on if you don't read it.

I love it. Okay, that sounds like a really, really good one. All right, my first book is a second in the series. And I feel really, really good about it. I liked it so much, I'm going to read even further into the series. So again, it's got to be a good series for me to feel this way. This is Good Girl Bad Blood by Holly Jackson. So this is the sequel to the massive bestseller that Holly Jackson wrote A Good Girl's Guide to Murder, which I love, love loved. Here's the setup. After everything that happened in the previous book, and the true crime podcast that she released about that case, which now has gone viral, our lead character, Pip, has decided that she is not a detective anymore. But she's gonna have to break that promise because someone she knows goes missing. The police won't do anything about it. Because it's a disappearance that for a variety of reasons looks like it could be voluntary. But Pip's spidey senses tell her that there's something more going on here. And so goes our story. I want to be really careful, obviously, about how much I talk about a second in the series, because I don't want to give anything away at all. So I'm stepping carefully here. But I like this book so much and I like this series so much

that I definitely wanted to bring it to the show. Series can be difficult for me, because I find that the sophomore outing is often times either more of the same, and so I'm tired of it, or it's gone in a completely new direction and doesn't give me the stuff that I loved from the first one. Luckily, Holly Jackson hits it on the head with this one. But huge caveat here. When I started this one, not only did I not have high hopes, because it was second in the series, but I didn't love the fact that for the first 20% of this book, full 20% of the book, that whole first section feels like it should be the end of the first book, not the beginning of the second book. There's absolutely no way that someone who maybe read the first book, but then read some other books in between would have enough memory of the details of that first book, not to be kind of frustratingly lost in the beginning of the second one. Now, if you went straight from one book to the other, that wouldn't be a problem. But that's not what most readers do, at least in my experience. So I will say that that first 20% had me frustrated, and I almost DNF'd it, but because I was listening to this on audio, and because I had heard so many people say that they really really loved this particular book, I decided to give it one more run right to like another 45 minutes to an hour and see how I felt at the end of that. I'm so glad that that 45 minutes got me on the other side of it, because this ended up being an absolutely fantastic book. Once the actual case in this story starts to come into play, I was in from the beginning of that, and then it just completely took off. So if you've read the first book, and you're sort of like, "What the heck is happening?" hang on, it's going to get better. This is definitely one that I would say hang on. Holly Jackson does a really really good job of writing this Pip character and the ancillary characters around her. And she does a great job with adding in believable details that really keep the story moving along. In fact, by the time I got to the end, I was so completely freaked out by one particular phrase that it was honestly like an ear worm for me. I couldn't get it out of my mind. And I still think about it all the time. This was a 4.75 star read for me. I'm not going to give it the full five stars because I did almost guit at the beginning. But it was so excellent that the rest of the book made up for it and got me all the way to 4.75 stars. So this is Good Girl Bad Blood by Holly Jackson. Fantastic Ya True Crime-y. Podcasty, murder mystery. It's got all that good stuff in it.

And also, even if like, you just literally paged to, like, if I were to give you a page number and say, "Hey, this new case starts on page blah," I still think the whole rest of the book, you'd be missing out on a lot because there is some enmeshment between the characters between the two books so definitely start with A Good Girls Guide to Murder because it makes the second one make more sense. And also because it's just a really, really good book. I did both of these on audio and I really, really like it in this format. With the true crime podcast elements of things, especially in book two, you get that full cast recording. It's just, it's a really good audio experience.

Okay, my second book this week is a middle grade book. It's Too Bright to See by Kyle Lukoff. Here's my bossiness. I'm just being so bossy lately Meredith, but I just have to say it. Do not read the full blurb on this because it will spoil this book for you. Here's what you need to know about this short and sweet middle grade book. It's the summer before Middle School and 11 year old Bug's best friend Moira, which that's a terrible name has decided the two of them need to use the next few months to prepare for middle school. Right. For Moira, this means figuring out the right clothes to wear, learning how to put on makeup and deciding which boys are cuter in the yearbook photos than in real life. This is what they spend their days doing. But none of this at all is appealing to Bug who doesn't particularly want to spend more time understanding how to be a girl. Besides, there's something more important to worry about. A ghost is haunting Bug's eerie old house in rural Vermont, and maybe haunting Bug in particular. As Bug begins to untangle the mystery of who this ghost is and what it's trying to say, an altogether different truth comes to light. Stop blurb no more blurbing because that is the whole mystery behind this book. This book is perfect for your middle grader that doesn't mind a little bit of ghostliness, but it's not scary at all. You don't have to worry about bad dreams with this middle grade pick. It's also LGBT affirming and it's #ownvoices lit, packing all of that into a very small package. Bug is an endearing main character that you can't help but root for. And even though I don't like Moira's name, I did like her as a side character. The author Kyle captures the story perfectly. This is perhaps one to add to your middle grade March shelves and stacks. And again, it's very short. It's like four hours on audio 150, 160 pages. So not intimidating at all for yourself or for the middle grader in your life that wants more of this like endearing but a little bit spooky story. This is Too Bright to See by Kyle Lukoff.

And I'm going to do something a little bit different with this current read segment, Kaytee because I'm going to put two books together in my current read because I just couldn't figure out a way to make these two work separately. Okay, you'll quickly understand why. So you guys know one of my obsessions in a really isn't obsession is all things Enneagram right? I absolutely live my life based on Enneagram. I talk about it all the time. It's really really important to me. One of the things I am constantly looking for because I get asked for it all the time, and Kaytee you do too, is a book about the Enneagram that is the perfect introduction book. Right. And so forever we've been talking about The Road Back to You by Ian Morgan Cron and Suzanne Stabile which is a fantastic book. Love it, love it. But recently, a book came across my desk that I think is an even better. Earlier, more basic introduction for people who are interested want to dip their toe in. This book is called The Enneagram Made Simple by Ashton Whitmoyer-Ober. She's @Enneagramashton, if you follow her on Instagram. This book is really, really good. I like it so much. Okay, so here's what you get in this book. You've got a very strong basic introduction. You learned about the origins of the Enneagram, the

nine personality types within the Enneagram and how to make sense of that weird little Enneagram symbol. You learn about your specific Enneagram type. There's a short guiz that will help you determine what your type is. And then when you learn what your type is, you'll dive deeper into what motivates you and explores ways that you can grow and improve your relationships with this knowledge. So, I absolutely love this. I want to say if you are well versed in the Enneagram this book is not for you. You don't need this. It is basic in the best way possible. Okay, so don't hear me say Enneagram and automatically think, "Oh, I need to get this book." Because it's really just to hand people who want to dip their toe in. Ashton goes over each type in sufficient detail and then delves into all the basic principles including where we go in stress and in health, she talks about the centers, the wings, the triads, she also briefly explains how each Enneagram type interacts with each other. And she ends each type chapter, and I love this part, with mantras that are useful for that type and some exercises that you can try to be the healthiest version of you. It's very simple. It's very well put together. It goes deep enough that if you read this book, you will no longer be an Enneagram beginner. You will understand it and you know, be able to talk about it at parties. That's what we all want to do. This is why I don't go to a lot of parties, right? Because this is what I want to talk about it. So again, not breaking any new ground here. But if this is what you need, it's perfect. As a bonus, it is available on Kindle Unlimited. If you don't want to actually get the book at least follow Ashton at like I said @Enneagramashton. She's a great follow if again, you're wanting to learn a little bit about the Enneagram. So that is The Enneagram Made Simple by Ashton Whitmover-Ober. So the other book that I want to talk about that I also read very soon on top of that one is for those of us who've been studying the Enneagram for a while, and we do want to go deeper and this is a book called The Journey Toward Wholeness and it is by the queen of the Enneagram Suzanne Stabile.

So if you have like I said, if you have studied, this is the great next step for your education. This book is written in Stabile's trademark clear, organized style. And this outing takes us deeper into the triads. So our types dominant center of intelligence, and the stances, our type's repressed center of intelligence. While there wasn't anything that I was totally surprised by, it did give me a deeper foundation in these elements of Enneagram study. I also loved the integration of a workbook-ish style here, giving you specific questions to ask yourself after each section to deepen your understanding, I really like to take in the books where I really want to learn something that's super effective for me, I really, really got a ton out of the section about my type in stress and in health and how to be more integrated. That's something that I think we all struggle with, but certainly type ones struggle with. So again, this is not at all for people who are just at the stage of wanting to figure out their type, or understand it day to day. But if you do want to go deeper, this is a worthwhile resource. So this is The Journey Toward Wholeness by Suzanne Stabile. So hopefully those two books together will give people no matter where they are, if they're interested, they'll be able to take it a step further.

Okay, my third book this week is Ain't Burned All the Bright by Jason Reynolds and Jason Griffin. This is a hugging book, but it's also one that I'm a little bit mad about. So let me tell you about it. This is this is a book you can finish easily in a single setting, or even multiple times. I read it like three times cover to cover in 45 minutes. It's not long at all. But first I'm gonna start with the bone I have to pick with the

publishing industry. I am a diehard Jason Reynolds girl. I follow him all the places. I'm on record as reading and loving and owning almost all of his books, and I did not find out about this book's release until release day. And that is a problem. There are people out there like myself, who are desperately in love with certain authors, ahem. And then the publishing industry is not doing a good job letting us know when our people are about to release something new. If I follow him everywhere, I should have known about this. Right? But instead, on release day. I was listening to an interview with him and figured out that he had a brand new book releasing that day. So I went I was already at my bookstore. Oh my gosh, do you guys have this? No. What are you talking about? There's a new Jason Reynolds book today. So I had to special order it into my bookstore and then after that they had it on the shelf because they were also excited about it. But I was very upset about the whole situation. Finally got it into my hands. Probably a week later, which is fine. We all survived. It was fine. But let me tell you about what I finally got into my hands. This book is gorgeous. It is a 348 page book, but it is made up of only three long sentences. Once I got it into my hands, I also found out it was the heaviest book I have ever held. Something about the pages. It's like, you know how when you pick up a coffee table book, you can tell that the pages inside are like, not magazine pages, but very, very thick so that they can be turned over and over again, this book looks like it's a regular sized book and then it weighs twice as much as a regular sized book. It's very, it messes with your head a little bit. So Jason Griffin and Jason Reynolds have been friends for many years and the way that their work comes together here in concert is breathtaking. I bought it in paper, heavy paper and on audio. And while I did love having Jason read it to me, it's so much more about the images on the page that audio really isn't enough. Even trying to tandem read it which y'all know I love to do where I'm having it read to me while I look at the images on the page was not working for me. I slowed it all the way down to 1x. But I wanted to spend more time on each page looking at each page than the audio left room for. You had to turn fast enough to keep up with the cadence of the sentences. So I still had I still had to turn off my Libro and be like, okay, just focusing on the book right now. Again, this is three long sentences. This is, I would call it COVID literature. Jason's main character, his dad is sick. They're looking, they're trying to catch their breath, the entire book, these three long sentences, we're trying to catch our breath, and take deep breaths and see what's around you. And I just, oh man, I even have goosebumps thinking about it again right now. So it feels disingenuous almost to bring it as a current read, like I said three long sentences. I read it three times in 45 minutes. It's not a long book. But it's powerful in the way that walking through an art museum is powerful. And looking at an artist's entire work on the walls in front of you is powerful, because you feel like Jason and Jason together here, bring you into the story so completely, that it's not just a book. It's not just three long sentences. It's so much more than that. It's stunning. I am so glad that I have it in multiple formats. But I'm very glad that I have it for my shelves, especially. And I'm very glad that I did find out about it's release eventually. It's Ain't Burned all the Bright by Jason Reynolds and Jason Griffin.

Holy Hannah. I mean, okay, I talked about Tiffany D. Jackson, you guys know she's an absolute auto by author for me. The last book I brought to the show was Grown. So absolutely loved it. I've read three, three books by her now and then I sat down to read White Smoke. I was unprepared. I was unprepared for White Smoke. Here's the setup. Our lead character is again, I love all of her lead characters, our lead characters Marigold, and Marigold, and her newly blended family moved from their small California beach town, to the embattled Midwestern city of Cedarville. Think a city kind of on the outskirts, the suburban outskirts of Detroit would put you kind of in the right space. Her mom has accepted a new job with the Sterling Foundation that comes with a free house, one that marigold now has to share with her super attitudinal Eddie Haskell like 10 year old stepsister, Piper. Piper is a great character you love to hate. The renovated picture perfect home on Maple Street sitting between dilapidated houses, surrounded by weary neighbors is "sus" as my 10 year old would say suspect, suspicious from the very beginning. Super sus. A lot of these things make no sense, okay, as soon as you arrive at this house, but that's only half the problem. Inside we've got more problems. Household items vanish, doors open on their own, lights turn off, shadows walk past rooms, voices can be heard in the walls, and there's a foul smell seeping through the vents that only Marigold seems to notice. Even worse, Piper, the annoying 10 year old sister, step sister, she keeps talking about a friend who wants Marigold gone. As the house closes in, Marigold learns that the danger is not just limited to the house on Maple Street. The city of Cedarville has it secrets too and secrets always find their way through the cracks. Oh my gosh. Tiffany D Jackson does like horror.

But the bones are there for her to be absolutely fantastic in this part of the genre. It is very safe to say that what so many blurbs about this book say is true, which is that it is a riff on the movie Get Out and reminds you also a lot of Riley Sager's Home Before Dark. It is a great mashup of those two things. This book is definitely full of scary moments. And I could not read it alone at night. I definitely had moments where my heart was racing and I was legitimately freaked out like you said and kind of like, I was like feeling like I was being watched or someone was in the room with me or did I smell a weird smell? She, Tiffany D Jackson wraps this book up with a really satisfying ending and I just continue to be so impressed with her. I cannot wait to see what she does next. This book was 4.5 stars for me and a strong seven on the All Things Murderful scary scale. So we're pretty scary here people for sure. This is White Smoke by Tiffany D. Jackson.

Okay, so now we're going to talk a little bit about our deep dive. We're going to talk about one night stand books and these are as I mentioned at the top of the show, like a slump buster or a palate cleanser. But a one night stand book is a very specific kind of slump buster or palate cleanser. Right and so the reason that this came up was because I and this has happened with other books, but just most recently, I read The Ten Thousand Doors of January by Alix Harrow, and just loved it, loved it loved it loved it. felt like "Okay, that's it. I'm never going to read another book because no other book is ever going to be as good. My reading's broken. I'm done." Like I just was bereft afterwards because I was like, "It's ruined me for all other books," and I kind of you know, harrumphed around and harrumphed around and finally, I was like, "You know what, I just need something, something that is going to get me out of this space," and so I picked up a book called Pretty Little Wife, by an author named Darby Kane, again, I'm going to be giving it the full treatment on the show in the not too distant future. It sucked me in, and it kept me turning the pages for a few hours. But honestly, finger gun to my head today, I could not tell you what that book is about. So here's my suggestion, Kaytee, and I want you to either agree with me or totally disagree with me. I'm suggesting that sometimes to break a slump, we need specifically something that will shock your system. That's short term, shallow, very interesting in the moment, but utterly forgettable in the long term. Do you see a place for a one night stand book in your reading? Or do you get out of a slump in a totally different way?

This book has everything I was wanting in a middle grade fantasy in it, and I loved it from beginning to end. I own multiple copies of this book. And even though book two has been delayed until August of 2022, when we originally thought we'd get it in April and no

I'm not mad about it at all, my preorder stands and Amari and the Great Game will be on its way to me on release day. I cannot wait to get it into my hot little hands. This first one in the series is Amari and the Night Brothers by B.B. Alston.

Since the 1970s, Fantasticland, which is a theme park... you guys know I love theme park books, has been the theme park where the tagline Fantasticland, it's "Fun is guaranteed." But then a hurricane hits the part of Florida actually that never usually gets hit by hurricanes like this and it isolates the park and the about 300 mostly teenage and early like late teens, early 20s employees who have volunteered to stay behind and make sure that the theme park is kept safe while it's closed down for the storm. So five weeks later, the authorities who rescue the survivors encounter a scene of horror. You guys this is horror, this is horror, hardcore horror. Okay. Photos soon emerge online of heads on spikes outside of rides, and human bones littering the gift shops. And those photos go completely, absolutely viral. So the question that we're left to ask is "How could a group of survivors, mostly teenagers commit such terrible acts?" This book is a major Whoa Nelly book for sure. It's a book that grabs you by the collar and will not let you go, you will speed through this very, very quickly. So, there are big upsides and big downsides to this book. But as a one night stand book, I stand by the fact that it cannot be beat. There are people who compare this to Lord of the Flies, and those comparisons are very, very apt. It's like a very upgraded, Lord of the Flies. And this book, also, I should say, makes the Hunger Games look like a Disney movie, for sure, but it's absolutely riveting. It's written in a unique style of linked interviews, this is absolutely original, at least I had never read anything like this before and it moves the story forward in a way that keeps you turning the pages. Each story, each interview that's been done leads to the perspective of the next story and the next story and the next story, you're getting it from all these different points of view, like I said, and I feel like I need to say it over and over again, it's incredibly violent and gory. From the outset, it concentrates on teenagers committing horrible crimes against each other, mostly senselessly, as a person and most especially as a parent, I do want to say that it is difficult to read. But it gave me a ton to think about, as far as how could this happen? And then also, how much would my fear or self preservation as a 19 or 20 year old have either made me kind of hide and not stop bad things from happening, or even participate in bad things in some way? Because I thought that was going to preserve my own safety, right? Like, what would you do if you were in that situation? It's

interesting to think about, the key question that the book really poses is "What kind of evil lurks in each of us?" And so this book is absolutely thrilling. It's a one night stand, but you will remember parts of it forever. Just a lot of this you can't unsee. This is Fantasticland by Mike Bockoven.

This one is great as a buddy read, because then you can have your WTF messages back and forth to each other. That's perfect.
