No. All right. Well, it's Yeah, it's not not months ago. So luckily, we're getting we're sort of collapsing down the timeline. So now this is just a few weeks ago that I that I read these books, I have three very, very different books that I'm bringing. But I'm really happy to be talking about all three of them today,

because these were all ones that I liked. They appealed to all my different kinds of readerly inclinations, right? We contain multitudes. These books are going to show you that this first book falls squarely into the camp of sometimes Meredith brings a book that is just really weird. And I haven't read a book that is as weird since I read The Library At Mount Char. This one is really, really strange, but good in its own way. This is the Rules for Vanishing by Kate Alice Marshall. And I don't think this is going to be on a lot of people's radar because I just have not seen it really anywhere. And so when I picked it up at the library out of bookish serendipity, right, because this is what I do. When I go to the library, I want to encourage all you all of you to do it, take a bunch of books out and give them a try. You never know when something's gonna hit. This is one of those that I found that way. So here's the setup. In the full documentary style of The Blair Witch Project, comes the campfire story of a missing girl, a vengeful ghost, and the girl who is determined to find her sister, no matter what it costs her. So once a year, a road opens up in a forest. And at the end of it, the ghost of Lucy Gallows beckons anyone who dares to go on that road. Lucy's game is not for the faint of heart. If you win, you get to escape with your life. But if you lose, you lose it all. So Sarah, our lead character, her sister, disappeared a year ago. And only Sarah knows where she is. Her sister was Becca and Becca went to find the ghost of Lucy Gallows. and she's trapped on the road that leads to her in the sleepy town of Briar Glen. Lucy's road is nothing more than local myth, local legend. But Sarah knows that it's real, and she has to go down that road to find her sister. So when Sarah and her skeptical friends meet in the forest to search for Becca, the mysterious road appears and unfurls itself for them, all they have to do is walk down it. But the path to Lucy is not of this world and it has a lot of rules. Every mistake means new horrors could come from any direction. There are vengeful spirits, broken, angry creatures that are just waiting for you to slip on one of those rules, and no one is guaranteed to make it home. The only certainty is the road has a toll and it will be paid. Oh my gosh, this book has a great setup. It has a really really great setup for sure. And I I really liked it so this is why a ghost horror, Okay?

It is not for HSPs it is not for young teens. I would not hand this book to Jackson, who's turning 10. So I want to be super clear about who this book is for. It's for older teens to adults, right? It came out a couple of years ago. And I would think with the premise, it's kind of as juicy as that one that it would have been, it would have garnered more buzz, but demitted just really didn't, I could find very few people who've read it on Instagram. But I read it in just a day and a half. And I was definitely interested in it all the way through. And it was one of those books where I wanted to set all my chores aside to read it. So there's that. But it is definitely weird. And there was a lot. It's, it's very, very intricately plotted, which I like, but it veers over the edge into sometimes becoming confused. So there's intricately plotted smart, and then there's Yeah, I'm trying too hard. And it's confusing. And sometimes in the middle, it veered over in that line, some of the things that set up came to a logical, satisfying conclusion. Other things I sort of was like, Hmm, that's a plot hole that wasn't completely worked out the way that it should have been. But I would definitely recommend this to anyone who really loves a puzzle, or a ghost story that you have to pay a lot of attention to, because there's definitely something to be said for that in this book. But the comparison made at the beginning of that of the marketing material to The Blair Witch Project does NOT land, it's nowhere near as creepy. It's definitely creepy in places, but it doesn't hit the

level of creepy that I think The Blair Witch Project did. So I want to be careful about that comparison being made. It has definite horror elements, and it gets pretty violent and weird. Again, I want to say all the triggers. So let's be very careful there. And it has plenty of teenage angst because we're following a group of teenagers who are going on this kind of quest. But it that piece of it actually, there was never so much angst that it got in the way of enjoying the book. What I will say is that it has it's one of these books that we're seeing them in the last few years that has like the mixed source style. So we've got like, pieces of podcast, pieces of interview, newspaper clippings, like those kinds of things interspersed. And I really liked that as a way of telling this particular story that was in fact, without that, I might not have been as interested. But that really, really kept propelling me through the story. So I thought a lot about who I would recommend this to and I think what I've arrived at is that it would be a great book to put into the hands of your older teenagers who say that they're not ready for Stephen King, but they're well past the RL Stine level of things, right. I think this would slot really well in with that particular group. There's a lot to think about and a lot to talk about in this book. So this is the Rules for Vanishing by Kate Alice Marshall.

We are not animals in this family. It was. Okay, we're gonna take a turn still go on a journey, though. So today, I'm going to do something a little different. I've never done this before. We've never done this before. But I want to highlight some incredible books from the Indie Press List that we've had for our Patrons. So all three of my choices today are from the Indie Press List. Okay, well, I've read many from those lists. These are three that I feel relatively confident that Meredith is not reading so she will not be

bringing them to the show. So that's how I chose the three that I'm bringing today. So first up, is The Ride of Her Life by Elizabeth Letts. This was a pick from Fabled in Waco, Texas, one of our beloved indie bookstores, and it's written by the same author as Finding Dorothy which both of us read and loved in 2019 ish. I want to say this one is more in her wheelhouse than that one is, than Finding Dorothy was even though I didn't know it at the time. So it turns out most of Elizabeth Letts other books are about horses. And this one is too. The Ride of Her Life, we meet Annie Wilkins, who is 63 years old, living alone in Maine and is about to lose her farm due to back taxes when she is diagnosed with pneumonia. That's the final straw for her. She's told to take it easy, but really feels like this might be the last chance she has for adventure. So she buys an old horse called Tarzan, and hitches up her dog Depeche Toi, to his saddle horn, and decides she wants to see the Pacific Ocean. This is a true story that takes place in 1954. So she is leaving home, having sold the farm to pay her debts, and has only a map of Maine to get her started to go all the way across the country. This is true to life adventure of the birth of the beloved curmudgeon kind you guys. It's a beloved curmudgeon on a real life adventure. How cool is that? Annie takes no ish from anyone. She is feisty and strong and smart and someone you have to root for. I will tell you because I hate being blindsided by stuff like this. There is a sad moment in this book, it has animals on the cover. And for those of you who read books with animals on the cover, you know that sometimes that does not end well. Right. There's an animal in peril, that will break your heart as a reader. I will not spoil this for you. But I will say that you reader will love all of these characters, all three of them until the end. That's as much as I can dance around that issue. But if anybody is really, really worried, like, I don't think I can handle this book, if such and such happens, send me a message. And I am happy to not spoil it for the general audience, but tell you exactly what you may or may not be worried about. I just don't want to reveal stuff to everyone. So know that that's available to you. Annie is like hashtag goals for old age like I like in in 30 years, I want to be Annie Wilkins. They called her "Jackass Annie" in her hometown. And I like I want to live to that moniker and kind of, you know, live up to that name. I loved reading her story. This one is not quite as fast paced, as you may expect, but it was excellent, well researched and wonderful the whole way through. So that one is The Ride of Her Life by Elizabeth Letts.

We can match it to our own. So this is When the Stars Go Dark by Paula McClain. Did you read this one?

Right. So this one is a recommend. It was a recommendation for me from Elizabeth from Fabled, not a part of the Indie Press List, but also, you know, in her recommendation to me personally. And so here's the setup of this of this mystery. Our lead character is Anna Hart. And she's a detective in San Francisco and she has a really specific talent and that is finding missing people. When tragedy strikes in her own personal life, Anna decides to leave San Francisco and go to the Northern California, the very North Northern California town of Mendocino right on the coast, to try to kind of put herself back together. She lived there as a child with her beloved foster parents. And now she's thinking that it might be the only place where she can kind of find enough peace to put herself back together. But as so often happens to these poor detectives, when they try to take some time off the day, she arrives in Mundo Mendocino, she learns that a local teenage girl has gone missing. So this crime very much unnerved Anna because it's reminiscent of an unsolved murder of a girl who went missing when she was growing up in Mendocino. And as Anna becomes obsessed with saving this missing girl, she's forced both to reckon with a murderer and with her very complicated past. You guys, I loved this book. This book is right in there in my mystery wheelhouse because this is the literary mystery, right? This is the smart literary mystery. We talk over and over again about the fact that we want more of these kinds of books right so Paul McCLain has done a fantastic job here. I like I said, I wasn't gonna necessarily bring into the show. I wasn't sure I was 100% in the mood for it. But then I listened to Sarah from Sarah's Bookshelves live interview Paula McCLain on her show. And as almost always happens when Sarah interviews an author, I've, all of a sudden, I'm interested in the book in a totally new way. Because she brings out things from the author about how and why, you know, the process the you know, the different data sources, the research, the personal things, the things in their personal lives that they bring to their, to the books that they've written that just all of a sudden made me really want to read the book. And I will say, I think my reading was so much better because I listened to that first. It really, that interview really informed my reading. So I want to encourage you, if you've been waiting to read When the Stars Go Dark, I think you should read it, go listen to that interview first, for sure. So this literary mystery, it has a great setting of the setting of Mendocino, it's on the northern California coast. Johnny and I love to visit Mendocino. So it's an area that I've been, you know, many, many times. It's absolutely beautiful, really rugged, rugged coastline, which is my favorite part of California is the really rugged Northern California coast. This book is also set in the 90s, which as a teenager in the 90s, this was very much, you know, nostalgic for me in a lot of ways. Also, mysteries, oftentimes, were being set in the 90s because we didn't have cell phones, and it makes mysteries more interesting. Before we had a cell phone. You know, it's hard to murder someone these days. So the other thing is, yeah, Thank heaven, right. So the other thing is that Paul McCLain works in several different true life, crime stories into the plot of her fictional story, including the Polly Klaas murder, which was a real life story that happened. That absolutely freaked me the EFF out because Polly Klaas was 13 when she was kidnapped from her home, in the middle of a sleepover in front of other children, like she was there with friends. And the guy came in, grabbed her, took her, killed her. Her parents were in the house. Her friends weren't in the rooms,

right? It's like, really terrifying.

Yeah, no, that's what I'm saying is it freaks me out. I mean, it's, uh, you know, and so she, Paul McCLain works in some of these true life cases into the actual narrative, which made it really, really interesting. I liked those elements. Now, if you read reviews of any of what I will describe as smart literary mysteries, they the reviews are going to do what they always do. They complain that it's too complex. And it wraps in too many storylines, and there's too much character development. The fact is these people who are whining in this way, they're going into these books wanting something more in the line of a thriller. And they're not getting that with a smart literary mystery. That's not what you're getting. You're getting more character development, you're getting a deeper, more complicated plotline. So that always irritates me when I when I read that, because I'm like, come on what this is what makes the book great. So this is not a thriller. The author expects you to have some patience and the ability to keep a few things separate in your brain. It's not a book to read when you're tired or sad, because really difficult things happen in this book. But when you're in a good place, and you're ready to take on something that's got a lot of layers and a lot of layered characters. I think this book is really well done. I highly recommend it. So this is When the Stars Go Dark by Paula McClain.

And if Darcy always makes you think of Pride and Prejudice, that's intentional. This is an LGBT romance with many subtle nods to P&P and I adore it. We're going to call it P&P. Because you know, Jane Austen and I we're like besties. Darcy is an insurance actuary. She loves numbers and statistics and spreadsheets and putting things in their place. She's a type one to her very core. She's analytical and punctual. And exactly the opposite of Elle. Elle is a pantser. As Gretchen Rubin calls them, a fly by the seat of her pants, astrologer, she's social media famous. She's up for anything and she's chill to a fault. They are complete opposites. This is apparent from their very first blind date set up by Darcy's brother, who is also Elle's new business partner. Elle arrives late, spills her wine on Darcy, and then bails in embarrassment. Which is why it's so surprising that the next time they see each other, she's roped into a fake dating scheme designed to keep their families off their backs. When are you going to get married? When are you going to settle down? How come you won't let me set you up on dates. They set this up to get their families off their backs. Since I already told you that this is a romance, you know where it goes from there. This book toes the line between opposites attract, and enemies to lovers and I'm totally here for it. Last week, I brought The Ex Talk to the show. And I mentioned it was slow to start. If that book was a crockpot, slowly warming up to temperature, this book is an oven broiler, don't get too close, or you're gonna get burned. And it's gonna happen fast. Because the sparks are there, they start flying quickly, I would consider this one pretty open door during the bedroom scene. So definitely know that going in. And you should also know that patrons heard behind the scenes blushy content about why I like this type of romance so much. But again, that's behind a paid wall because the entire internet does not need to know about that. So this one was a pick from Novel Neighbor in Missouri for the month of August. And I thought it was a great pick. And I loved it from beginning to end. It's Written in the Stars by Alexandria Bellefleur. And I was sure that Meredith was not going to bring this on to the show either.

So this is right this is Romancing the Duke by Tessa Dare. So Tessa Dare is my go to for romance. I absolutely love the way that she writes her the way that she writes her books. And because Yeah, because I had two really heavy books before I wanted to bring something a little bit lighter. So here's the setup for this one, as the daughter of a very, very famous author is Isolde Ophelia. Goodnight, get a load of that name, Izzy for short, grew up on tales of brave knights and fair maidens. But things have definitely not gone for Izzy the way that she expected. Her father is gone, and her fortunes have definitely changed. And at this point Izzy's given up on traditional romance. She really at this point just needs shelter like a roof over her head. So when she is summoned to a decrepit mansion for a meeting with a strange attorney who tells her against all odds, she has inherited said decrepit

mansion. She can't believe her luck. She's totally over the moon. There's just one catch. Kaytee, I know you're never going to be able to guess what this catch is?

So I ask you guys, what do you think is going to happen from there? What could possibly happen from there? Oh, I love Tessa Dare. She just is 100% for me. I just I absolutely love her. Do her books have a formula? Yes they do. Do I care? I do not. When I'm in the mood for this. I don't know. There's lots of times where I wouldn't want something that's formulaic. But in that particular mood, nothing else does it for me like Tessa, Tessa Dare. As I said, this was a great book for me to read when my best friend and I went to Hawaii. We had lots of time to read. And one of the most fun things that we did is as I was reading I she was reading her own book, but I would sort of keep her abreast of the plot as it was going on. And I kept saying Well, here's what's going on, what happened next. And then I would read to her when it actually happened. And we just thought this was delightfully hilarious that I can predict exactly what was going to happen next. But really, for me, I love that predictability here. Sometimes I just absolutely crave it. And I seek these particular books out for just this reason. Now, also, I will say because they are this predictable, I don't read them back to back to back. I don't read them over and over again, I probably read one every 18 months. That's about right for me, because it keeps it really fresh and it keeps it just a really sweet treat. So if you love saucy, spicy, open door historical romance cuz that's what this is. I just think you can't do better than Tessa Dare. So this is Romancing the Duke by Tessa Dare.

Yep, yep, I'm not Southern. I have no dog in this fight. But the but the Bookish Friends, they were divided on whether it's pronounced musca-dine

or musca-deen. I'm going to go with the way the audiobook narrator said muscadine so I'm gonna honor that. So we find Geneva, she's dead in the muscadine arbor. Her children are Lila, Henry and Abigail. They come together afterwards, to sort out her estate and her funeral and to mourn her and to try and figure out what the heck she was doing out there with the muscadines and a spoon. Lila and Henry have both left Wesleyan, Georgia, their hometown to forge their own paths while Abigail stayed behind to dote on their mother. The siblings have to work through their differences and their dynamic is really wonderful. In this book, it felt very true to life to me, my sibling, and I and my in laws, and I have all brought our own strong personalities and drama to our relationships in our lives. And Pamela Terry does a really great job depicting that on the page. The way this story unfolds is really lovely and revealing. And I found myself rooting not just for the three main siblings, but the generation above them, as we unpack their family drama and their history. This is in the tradition of other books that we would call like sitting shivah books or deathbed books that that we've read, like we just recently talked about All This Could Be Yours by Jami Attenburg, but with much more likable characters, which is exactly what I was hoping for. When I set it up on the Indie Press List episode, it delivered on every level for me, I gave it five stars. It was a huge hit. This was a Fabled pick for the Indie Press List in July, and I loved it. It was The Sweet Taste of Muscadines by Pamela Terry.
