This festival just started last year with this exceptional lineup of authors. But I already had travels planned during that weekend. This year, it's May 19 through 21st. All right. The first book I'm going to bring is... and it's surprising that I had not really dipped very much into this author before, but I read a book called Silent Voices by Ann Cleves.

Oh, okay.

Meredith Monday Schwartz 06:36

Famous mystery writer. Good friend of Louise Penny. It seems like an absolute slam dunk for me, which it definitely was. But the way that I got into it was that I started watching the Vera Stanhope series on Britbox. And that is the show that I'm watching that's my like comfort show right now. I'm watching all the episodes one by one by one. So this is one that I read because I wanted to have actually dipped into both right? So here's the setup. Our lead character is that epic and fantastic curmudgeon DCI Vera Stanhope. God, I love Vera so much. She's played in the show by Brenda Blethyn. She's recently had some heart trouble, she has angina. And so she grumblingly has started going into a gym and swimming regularly. This is a huge step for Vera. She does not take very good care of herself. When she finds the body of a woman in the sauna of that gym, she of course, looks at the body closely and realizes that there are some bruises around the victim's throat so she knows this is not a death by natural causes. And her team gets called in. So Vera and her colleagues, the side characters I love in this series, they uncover details of the victims past that may explain why she was murdered. There are a lot of people who it turns out would have would be great candidates for this. But the person they arrive at at the beginning feels too tidy for Vera. She knows from long experience that there's no such thing as a simple case, and this one gets more and more complex by the minute. Okay. So this is book four in the Vera Stanhope series. Why am I reading book four? This is because books one through

three were covered in the episodes of the Vera show that I watched. So I wanted to dip in where it was going to be a new plotline to me. And I'd heard that the that the shows, when they're based on one of her novels, they hue pretty closely to the books. So that's why I started in on book four, not because I'm an animal. I really do think if you're going to read these, you should start with book one because we learn a lot about Vera and all of her colleagues and you just care about this group of people. So start at the beginning. I absolutely loved the show. And I loved this book, but I hate the titles of this series. Silent Voices is this one. These are the most meaningless titles I really, that they're the most forgettable like just two words put together that it's just it's absolutely ridiculous. Okay, but the books in the stories themselves are really really good. As I said Vera Stanhope has just become my heart. She's the female equivalent of all the damaged male detectives that we see in other especially British police procedurals, only she's not just that. She's a fully fledged person. She's a fully formed, middle aged, incredibly intelligent woman who loves her career and hates the rest of her life. The way she's written in this story, it sometimes make you want to smack her because she really can be curmudgeonly, but it also makes you really understand her and I love when someone can write in that way. These books are definitely classic British police procedurals, they are slow burn. This is not at all back to back wall to wall thriller action. This is character development and setting development and well constructed plots that move along in what I would describe as a medium pace. These are great puzzles to solve. And this particular book has a very complex and layered mystery at its center. I listened to this on audio, and I think I will probably take all of them in in that way. I found myself wanting to fold that extra load of laundry just to get a little bit further into the story. Vera herself is by turns abrupt and harsh and taciturn and then unexpectedly affectionate. And I love her so much. I'm so glad that I started listening and watching the series because it has become not just a favorite kind of an obsession. I'm working my working my way through season four, and the 12th season just dropped. So obviously they have taken the books and they have built stories around the characters that do not exist. It's they've built onto the books, and I'm all for it. They've done a fantastic job. This is Silent Voices by Ann Cleaves.

Perfect. Okay, I also have a mystery series to bring today. And I'm going to talk about the third one because apparently that's what we're doing right now. I'm going to talk about Finlay Donovan Jumps the Gun by Elle Cosimano. So this is the third installment in the Finlay Donovan series. It just came out January 31. And normally, I don't continue with a series I mean, or at least I won't bring it to the show, even if I'm going to keep reading it. So I don't even think I brought Book Two to the show ever. That's fine. We're going for it anyway. I really wanted to take the time to talk about this one. Longtime listeners will remember that this is a series that Meredith cannot get behind because it does not involve good

decisions from our main character. She's a big dumb dumb, and we all want to smack her across the face.

That is exactly what's happening here. I however, it loves a mystery series A where I'm smarter than the person and it has that element of humor. I really enjoy working that humor into a mystery series and this one delivers on that. The setup from the first book is that Finlay is a romantic suspense writer with writer's block. She's meeting with her agent at Panera and describing the plot of her next novel when a woman nearby overhears her and assumes that she has a contract killer. Instead, this pulls Finlay into a world that involves accidental dead bodies, quite unsavory characters, and her ex husband somehow getting snagged into the entire thing. One of my favorite elements of this series is the friendship and business partnership that Finlay accidentally forms with her nanny whose name is Vero. Vero is smart as a whip. She's very funny, and she calls Finlay on her BS all the time. I love her. They have great dialogue between them. And both of them are juggling the care of the children with the dangerous situations that they find themselves in. In this third installment in the series, Finlay is researching her next novel and trying to determine the identity of a rival contract killer, who may have murderous sights set on her ex husband, Steven. She doesn't like the guy but he's the father of her children, and she for sure doesn't want him dead. That trail leads her to a citizens Police Training Academy, which Meredith I think we should do this sometime as like our business partnership retreat. We should like go to Police Training Academy and like learn how to like pick up a disabled body or like shoot someone in the chest. The way that they have to work through this training academy together, it left me in stitches, it was so funny.

Like a great bonding experience. Right? So she's hoping to figure out her storylines and also maybe figure out if there's a crooked cop involved with this contract killer situation. As is typical, a comedy of errors ensues with Finlay and Vero being way too good at some stuff like moving a dead body, which catches the attention of the police traders. Finlay is sure that cop Joey is the crooked contract killer that she's looking for. So she spends a lot of her time trying to sneak around and find evidence of this. We've got the signature humor, the madcap situations a densifying ending. She continues to deliver on this premise that she has put forth. I'll continue to read this series. Why I really wanted to bring this book up is because everyone knows that Finlay has a love interest throughout books one, two and three. There's a hot cop named Nick and a bartender in law school named Julian so it's a love triangle. Oh, and both of these guys like pose a danger to Finlay, right? Somebody going to law school could prosecute her. A cop could figure out that there's a dead body in her car. That's a bad it's a bad thing.

You know, work in your personal family stories or name a cool character after your husband, kid. Uncle, whatever. But but the hot cop that everybody's like lusting after what?

But at the same time, because 2023 is a year of me not wanting to yuck people's yum, I know how many people including you have really, really enjoyed it, or you love their way through them. And so I think that that, I think that that's great.

It is great. I will continue to read the series. But somehow I have to find a way to get like selective amnesia, and forget that we're reading the name of the author's teenage son as the very hot cop that I really like named Nick. In the meantime, this is Finlay Donovan Jumps the Gun by Elle Cosimano third book and the Finlay Donovan series.

All right. I'm glad that that was a hit for you. I'm glad that we are normalizing bringing books in the series because the other thing that 2023 is for me is the year of reclaiming my own agency. And part of that is that I want to read the books that I want to read. And sometimes that means I'm going to read in a series, correct, which means that we're going to talk about on the show and you know what, I think people are fine with that. I think it's fine. We've convinced ourselves that they're not fine with that. And that's silly. We should just read what we want to read. Alright, I'm now going to talk about a book that I really wanted to like but I very much did not. And you know, I don't like to do this. But again, you hear about all my reads so I have to bring some womps. This book... Oh, I was so excited about it. It is called Blackwater Falls by Ausma Zehanat Khan. Alright, here's the setup. As we start our story, which is the first in a new series from this author, girls from immigrant communities have been disappearing in the small Colorado town of Blackwater Falls. But not unexpectedly in these parts, the local sheriff is very slow to act, and the girls' whereabouts remain a mystery to their grieving families. At last, the calls for justice cannot be ignored anymore when the body of a star student and refugee Syrian teenager Razan Elkader is positioned deliberately in a religiously symbolic way and found in a mosque. Detective Inaya Rahman of the Denver Police is recruited to solve results murder, and quickly uncovered a link to the other missing and murdered girls. But as Inaya gets closer to the truth, outside forces find ways to obstruct her investigation. So she turns to her female colleagues attorney Areesha Adams and Detective Catalina Martine, for help in finding the truth to what's happening to these girls. These three have bonded together from their experiences in the past working with vulnerable groups and now they must work together to expose the conspiracy behind the murders before another girl disappears. Doesn't that sound so so good? Just cracklingly good, right? Yes. And I know a lot of people have loved the other series that Ausma Zehanat Khan writes, and so I was really, really excited about this. I buddy read this with my good friend, Betsie Ikenberry, we were both really, really excited to read this one. It ended up getting three stars for me. And just barely, I was very much teetering between two and a half and three stars. So the other thing is, I saved this to be one of my first books of 2023 because I really wanted to start the year off with a bang, I know. Alright, here's what I did like about the book and there were definitely things to like. The prose is gritty and real. And it drew me in from the start. Khan has a sure hand when setting the stage of her novel, and when we first started out both Betsie and I were very happy with what we were reading. I also loved our lead detective. And reading about the experience of Muslim women trying to navigate a Colorado old boys police department was very interesting and enraging, but interesting and really well done, and Inaya Rahman, our lead character is smart and grounded in a way that had me very invested in her success. There are several scenes with her and her Muslim family, and I felt like I had a front row seat to their real lives and real conversations, dialogue that was done very, very well as they worked through various expectations, and frustrations with each other. The book was at its absolute best, I think, in those scenes. But from that strong start, things started to go wrong. The book immediately began to be not a slow burn, but a slow burn out. And it just drags on and on as the author introduced more and more thorny issues, race and religion is

enough to bite off in a novel. But then she added unions, armed Steelers, crooked cops, race related violence and far right extremists to name just a few. Add to that a workplace romance that not only didn't feel realistic, but made me angry and cringe. And my head was just spinning. I felt like not only was she doing too much, but she was telling me everything she used over and over again, the tool of giving us the characters interior thoughts, which were just them wondering what could have happened with this crime? And I kept thinking, I know, I'm wondering the same things. Why don't we go out and find out what's going on? It was so it was so frustrating. And she didn't show the important themes or give me a true sense of many of the characters. And those big thorny issues that she's based the story on. She pounded me over the head about them so hard that I got a headache. My overwhelming feeling at the end of this book was just being tired. And that is so disappointing, because I really wanted to like Blackwater Falls by Ausma Zehanat Khan.

Now, is this the first one you've read by her Meredith?

Meredith Monday Schwartz 23:02

Yes. it is.

Okay, because I know, remembering way back two and a half years ago, when Roxanna was first on the show, one of her current reads was this author. So I wasn't sure if Roxanna was involved in this decision to help you.

No, she was not. And in fact, when I obviously I was talking to her about reading it. And she was like, I really wished you would started with the other series. Oh, no. She was right. That's right. So it seems it seems like that other series, I mean, I've heard many trusted sources say that her other series is quite good. So I'm definitely not putting her in a category of I would never read her again, because I would actually really love to read some more of her work and really get into it.

Okay, that sounds like a good plan. All right. I have nonfiction for my second one. It's called How to Break Up with Your Phone by Catherine Price.

Oh, yeah.

Don't we all? We're all interested now. Right?

Yep.

Kaytee Cobb 23:57

So I started and finished this book in early January, but then waited a full month to bring it to the show because I wanted to complete the 30 day detox program that is included in this book before I talked about it here. So this one released in 2018, and I've had it on my shelves nearly the entire time, which is embarrassing. At the beginning of 2023, I decided I wanted a different relationship in my life with my phone in general, and with social media in particular. I had already taken some steps to change how I related with my phone, and I knew that I needed some guidance to get the rest of the way there. Catherine Price starts this small book with her own story of realizing she had a phone addiction. She includes a standard set of questions at the beginning that is used as a like a standardized test to determine if someone has a phone addiction. And guess what? If you've got a cell phone I pretty much guarantee that you have a phone addiction. They're so ubiquitous that it's nearly impossible to not have one according to this like metric that she uses. She then spends the first half of the book through the research, and admits at the beginning that the first section is meant to scare you straight as the reader. It's heavy on the statistics that many of us have heard about the number of hours we spend on screens each day, the ways that apps are designed to create the maximum dopamine response, the ways that it's changing for the generation coming after us. And the ways that social interactions online, no matter how much we want to believe it cannot replace real life social interactions. They're just not substitutable. She then introduces a relatively simple 30 day detox program. It's meant to start with the reader just noticing their own habits, making decisions about what they'd like to be different in their lives, and then taking steps to make those changes. There's not a book that ends with you buying a landline and moving to a hole in the ground and only living, you know, off grid. It's a book that allows the reader to make just more informed choices about how much time and energy they want to spend on social media and what apps they're going to allow to have access to them rather than vice versa. I will say that I had already made a number of changes that she suggested as first steps and the week or two. So the first couple of weeks of this detox were like, Oh, well, I've already done that, oh, I've already done that. Right. So a lot of that was just not new information for me, turning off and silencing notifications, blah, blah, blah, that easier stuff. However, I did really enjoy the opportunity to push myself and to find other ways to spend my time and think about what else I could be doing with my time that didn't involve mindless scrolling, and a screen in my hands. For that reason I do recommend this book. Is it going to change your life? Probably not. But will you end this book and this challenge having a better handle on your own time and attention? I think so. And she does talk about how our attention spans have gotten shorter and shorter as everything comes in these smaller bite size increments. All of us as readers, if you're here listening to Currently Reading, you're a reader. All of us want that longer attention span, we want to be able to sink into a book. We talked about quiet books a few weeks ago that required that more focused attention and the phones are messing with that attention, capability and span. So for that reason, I think any reader would like to get a better handle on social media and feeds and phones in order to sink deeper into the books that he or she loves. So this is How to Break Up with Your Phone by Catherine Price.

I love that. I've been thinking a lot about that, Kaytee, and one of my favorite follows is Ryan Holiday, who does The Daily Stoic. He also owns The Painted Porch bookstore here in Texas. And one of the things that he says often is to ask yourself about whatever app you're using, "Am I using this app or is it using me?" Because I think that there are times we're going to check on something, we're going to

comment on a few things in a group, we especially want to be active, and that's us using an app. When we find ourselves just mindlessly scrolling, that's the app using us. And so I just keep thinking about that over and over again. And just being mindful about that one thing has had me putting my phone down more regularly. So I would love, I'd be very interested in reading about more ways that I can stop spending my time that way because it does get in the way of so much.

I am so excited to talk about this book because I feel like this is one of those backlist books that had me asking "Why are we not all reading this book?" It was such a joy to read. This is The Rook by Daniel O'Malley. Oh my gosh, I love this book. Okay, Marli James bookish friend Marli James recommended to me. She wanted us to know that it was actually her friend Amy Olson, who recommended it to her. So again, when you recommend a book you love, you never know how it's going to travel. And then all of a sudden you're hearing about it on a podcast and in front of 35,000 people. So thank you, Amy for that. Here's the setup of the book. And this setup is short and sweet and just a teensy bit more than what I got from Marli when she recommended it to me because that very little setup was perfect. Our lead character is, sort of, Myfanwy Thomas, Myfanwy rhymes with Tiffany, it's Welsh. Okay, you're gonna that's the one thing that the very beginning of the book you're gonna have to get over.

So when you read the book, and you will, you're going to understand why I say sort of Myfanwy awakens in a London park surrounded by dead bodies, all of whom have blue latex gloves on. Like I'm in. That's all Marli said to me. And I was like, download, okay, but here we go. With her memory completely gone, she must trust the instructions left by the person who purports to be her former self. Those instructions are left luckily in the pocket of the coat that she wakes up in, and she has to rely on those instructions in order to survive. Myfanwy quickly learns that she is a rook, a high level operative in a secret agency that protects the world from supernatural threats. But there is a mole inside her organization and that person wants her dead. Oh my god, this book is so good. Okay, it's a romp. This

book is romp. And it was so unexpected. Like I said, I went in almost completely blind. So then the whole book could just unfold in front of me like the most amazing flower, and it had so many beautiful layers of interest. I love the complex structure of the secret agency that she is a part of. I very much loved the lead character, even though her name is Myfanwy. And I loved the hilarious narration that had me laughing out loud from the beginning. It is so smart and tongue in cheek and just, as soon as I met this new version of Myfanwy, I was like, I want her to be my best friend. We are two peas in a pod. I loved the way that we got more and more info on the pieces the backstory that we needed, just as we needed them. We truly stood in for our narrator, we felt what she was feeling. We felt confused and emboldened and excited, we felt the thrill of being innately good at a job which you had never done before. She sort of just naturally knew how to do what she needed to do. And it was so satisfying. I also have to say I loved the superpowers that are a part of this world in this world. Many people are what's called powered. And those powers are weird sometimes, like their people could be powered in the most amazing ways. And the secret agency that they work for would figure out how to use those powers in battle and sometimes they were not used in battle. They were just used in more prosaic administrative ways and that was equally interesting. Anytime people are doing what they are especially like born to do it's just, I just absolutely love it. It was so imaginative. Also, I loved the Easter eggs throughout. Look for grin inducing tidbits on Martha Washington and the wardrobe door to Narnia. You have to be paying attention. But if you are there is so much to love here. In an Instagram post I made mention that The Rook has elements of Men in Black in that it's an organization devoted to keeping supernatural things in line in check from killing humans but also secret, but on further consideration, I really have come to believe that that is a poor comparison. Men in Black is so base and simple. The Rook is elevated and elegantly plotted. It's so very high minded and civilized and British, which is interesting because the author is Australian. And this is his debut. This book is more aptly described as a perfect combination of the book Hench and The Windsor Knot, with a dash of James Bond thrown in, and a hefty scoop of girl power. It's a series and I immediately downloaded the second one. This is why I said when I want to read a series, I'm gonna read a series because you're gonna be hearing about that. This book is totally 100% able to be read as a standalone. So it is a series but everything wraps up really nicely. The book is so good. It's long. It's over 500 pages, but it never felt long. In fact, the pages flew by and I found myself staying up way too late saying just one more chapter. I have to find out what is going to happen. And that is my favorite kind of reading. This is The Rook by Daniel O'Malley.

Right Meredith has her superpowers also you guys. Okay, my third book is the first one that I read of 2023. But it was not a disappointment like Blackwater Falls. It's called We Deserve Monuments by Jas Hammonds. This is a newer YA release that I got from Libro.FM as a galley because they do those ALC program releases. It was my first book of 2023 and I started out the year on the right foot because I gave it four and a half stars. Avery is our main character. She is uprooted from her life in Washington DC, which was a pretty decent life, in order to move south with her family to Georgia, and take care of her terminally ill grandmother, Mama Letty. Avery's mom and her mother Mama Letty have a frosty relationship and it's been that way for Avery's entire life. She doesn't understand it. It makes for a tense school year ahead as the two circle around each other with undisguised animosity and tension. But every time Avery tries to uncover the truth of the difficulties between them, she's shut down by both matriarchs. Thankfully, Avery finds a friendship to lose herself in next door. Simone and her mother have been constantly in Mama Letty's life. Ever since Avery's mother left town with her daughter in tow many years ago. Her friendship with Jade, daughter of the town's most influential family makes the three of them a wonderful trio. But Jade's mother was murdered years ago, and that murder remains unsolved. So was Avery's grandfather. Add to that the icy cold reception whenever her mother and grandmother are in the same room, and you've got a pot on the stove ready to boil over. There's a central mystery to this story, which kept me listening at warp speed as y'all know. But there's also a sweet and secret romance between two of the girls, which means there has to be a fallout at some point, right? Jade and Simone have been friends for a long time. But they've made a rule in their friendship, to not get involved in relationships because of the way that Jade disappeared earlier in their friendship when she got involved with a boy. So like, oh my god, we're never doing that again. We're the best right? There's also a really racist history to the town, interwoven with Avery's own history that we need to uncover as readers. At this point, I've also started a great rec from Elizabeth Barnhill at Fabled called Times Undoing by Cheryl Head. This novel is based on a murder in the writers own history. And an image of the writers grandfather is even worked into the cover art. That one comes out February 28, and has a lot of similar themes to it, but from an adult perspective. So this one's kind of a double rec. If you like the idea of an unraveling of historical mystery, and a fish out of water story in the south, Times Undoing is the one I'll point you to even though I haven't finished it yet. If you don't mind a YA storyline and characters along with better romance I'll heartily recommend We Deserve Monuments by Jas Hammonds, an excellent debut novel.
